FORM CRS (Client Relationship Summary)

AG Asset Advisory, LLC is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as an investment adviser and, as such, we provide advisory services rather than brokerage services. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ and it is important for you, our client, to understand the differences. Additionally, free and simple tools are available to research firms and financial professionals at Investor.gov/CRS, which also provides educational materials about brokerdealers, investment advisers, and investing. This Client Relationship Summary describes the services and fees we offer to "retail" investors, which are natural persons who seek or receive services primarily for personal, family, or household purposes.

What investment services and advice can you provide me?

Account Monitoring: If you open an investment account with our firm, as part of our standard service we will monitor your investments on an ongoing basis and will review your account at least quarterly.

<u>Investment Authority</u>: We primarily manage investment accounts on a **discretionary** basis whereby **we will decide** which investments to buy or sell for your account. You may limit our discretionary authority (for example, limiting the types of securities that can be purchased or sold for your account) by providing our firm with your restrictions and quidelines in writing.

We also offer **non-discretionary** management services whereby we will provide advice, but **you will ultimately decide** which investments to buy and sell for your account. You have an unrestricted right to decline to implement any advice provided by our firm on a non-discretionary basis.

<u>Investment Offerings</u>: We primarily use mutual funds to implement client portfolios. However, we provide advice on various types of investments and do not limit our advice to a specific type of investment or product.

Account Minimums and Requirements: In general, we require a minimum account size to open and maintain an advisory account, which may be waived in our discretion.

What fees will I pay?

The following summarizes the principal fees and costs that you might pay when engaging our firm for investment advisory services. For detailed information, please refer to our Form ADV Part 2 by clicking this link: <u>ADV Part 2A</u>

- <u>Asset-Based Fees</u> Fees are typically payable quarterly in advance; however, we may negotiate other fee-paying
 arrangements. Since the fees we receive are based on the value of your account, we have an incentive to
 increase your account value which creates a conflict.
- Fixed Fees Fee payment arrangements are negotiable.
- <u>Performance-Based Fees</u> Payable annually in arrears. Performance-based fees may create an incentive for our firm to make investments that are riskier or more speculative.
- Other Advisory Fees You may pay additional advisory fees charged by third-party managers, which are separate and apart from our fees, depending on your investment objectives and selected portfolio strategy.

Examples of the most common fees and costs applicable to our clients are: Custodian fees; Account maintenance fees; Fees related to mutual funds and exchange-traded funds; Transaction charges and related costs when purchasing or selling securities; and, Other product-level fees associated with your investments.

You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying.

Key Questions to Ask Your Financial Professional

 Help me understand how these fees and costs might affect my investments. If I give you \$10,000 to invest, how much will go to fees and costs, and how much will be invested for me?

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means:

Third-Party Payments: Our firm's financial professionals may licensed as independent insurance agents. These
persons will earn commission-based compensation for selling insurance products, which is separate and in
addition to our advisory fees. This practice presents a conflict of interest because they have a financial incentive
to recommend insurance products to you.

How do your financial professionals make money?

The financial professionals servicing your account(s) are compensated by salary and may receive a bonus, which is based on the amount of client assets we service, the time and complexity required to meet a client's needs, and/or the revenue the firm earns from the financial professionals' services. Certain financial professionals receive commission-based compensation based on the investment and/or insurance products sold (i.e. differential compensation or commission) in their separate capacity as a licensed insurance agent.
